

DVAR TORAH

The theme of the second half of Sefer Shemos culminating in this week's Parsha, Pekudai - is the building of the Mishkon, Apart from being a physical structure that was the centre of G-dliness for the Jews in the desert, the Mishkon is also the prototype for the Mikdash Me'at inside each of us, and thus the symbol of making a home for the Eibishter here in the lowest realms.


This week's Likutei Torah discusses in-depth the concept of Dirah, teaching how iskafia (restraint) and is'hapcha (transformation) are the main methods of building that Dirah. Just as we need to employ iskafia as we work on our inner struggles, so do we need to feel (even if just at certain times) the is'hapcha – and sense our Nefesh Elokis.

One of the biggest insults for a Chossid is to be called a "Chitzon", someone whose outsides (Chitzoniyus) don't match their insides - someone who is "masquerading" as more Chassidishe than, in fact, they are. True Chassidim would go out of their way to be mevatel themselves, hide their greatness and avoid anything that might have a sniff of yeshus.

It is told that while the Rebbe was in France, he would walk to shul each day with a newspaper under his arm. At one point it occurred to another member in the Shule that the Rebbe was holding the same newspaper every day. Why the Rebbe chose this hanhaga is beyond any of us, but we do know that it was emblematic of the Rebbe's style before taking on the nesiyus. We can only imagine that the Rebbe chose this worldly device to avoid unwelcome attention about his true calling. Although he resisted the call for some time, when the Friediker Rebbe called on the Rebbe to show his true colours he ultimately did and he wowed everyone.

Although being noticed is not a characteristic of being a Chossid, sometimes the importance of being noticed fulfills a more important purpose than staying below the radar, however, admirable the latter might be.

We all try to be chassidisher yidden heeding the ratzon of the Rebbe to the best of our abilities. But are we doing it in a way that our children are noticing? Most of us are being mehader in mevarer netzutzos in gashmiyusdiker lives. We aren't shy to teach our kids the value of elevating the danishes and sushi. But do they see us davening like a mentch? Do they see us making a kviyus itim in nigleh and chassidus? Suddenly for ruchniyusdiker inyanim we become a pnimi, focusing on doing good things in private. We can't let the vetzer convince us that we aren't holding at that level yet, we need to do any part we can to build the last few bricks of the Mishkan/Mikdash. ...continued next page

STUDENT PARSHA REFLECTION

This week's Parsha is Parshas Pekudai and next week's Parsha is Parshas VaYikra. These two parshiyos are connected.

This week the Parsha talks about the cloud that covered the mishkan and stopped Moshe from entering the Ohel Moed – concealment. Next week, the Parsha will talk about Hashem calling to Moshe to speak to him in the Ohel Moed – revelation. When you have revelation after concealment, if feels much greater. We also see this with Baalei Teshuva, that when they do Teshuva the Mitzvos feel much holier since they are coming from a place where there hasn't been Torah and Mitzvos. It feels much greater than someone that was brought up with Torah and Mitzvos their whole lives. In fact someone who does Teshuva with a whole heart can turn all of their avairos into merits. Since that was what caused them to do Teshuva.

Q: What can we learn from all of this?

A: That a person should never think of himself that he is on such a low level he cannot do Teshuva, because a person can always do Teshuva to the point htat his avairos turn into merits. This also applies with our generation which might not be as great as generations before, but we should always remember that we are the generation of Moschiach!!!

What I learned from Reb Arel

Reb Arel would often use the expression "Respect But Suspect" which means when dealing with (certain) people, one should be respectful, but at the same time, be cautious.

Now of course Reb Arel understood the importance of emulating the virtues of our Patriarchs, and in relation to Yaakov Avinu, it says that he was an Ish Tam – someone who spoke plainly what he was thinking.

So how do we understand this expression of Reb Arel's, which would seem to invite cynicism and concealment in the area of relationship management?

Oo-ly Yesh Leimar (perhaps we could say): this expression recognises that every (Jewish) person has a dual consciousness. The person's nefesh Elokis, which is inherently other-centred, makes him worthy of profound respect.

But the same person also possesses a nefesh Ha'behamis which relentlessly pursues self-indulgence and self gratification – often at the expense of others around them.

In the face of this second nature, a person should neither be naïve nor unguarded.

Awesome relationship managers (like the Rebbe), conscious of this duality, are able to encourage the ascendancy and influence of the nefesh Elokis in the thought, speech and action of their counterparts. **Respect, but suspect!**

MRS LORENZ


This week the grade 3/4 class combined for the first time. The boys are to be congratulated for working so well

GRADE 5




This week the boys delved even deeper into the Gemora and the boys were truly fascinated by the way 'Gemora thinks' and reading the back and forth debates etc.
