DVAR TORAH

One of the 13 (or 15) items requested by Hashem for the construction of the Mishkon was oros tachashim - Tachash skins. Far from incidental, these skins were used to make the outer covering of the Mishkon. But what were they?

Some of the commentaries explain that 'tachash' describes a certain dye (R' Saadia Gaon) or treatment of leather (R' Avraham ben HaRambam), rather than a particular creature. Others suggest that the tachash is a tayish, a thick-skinned species of wild goat (Ralbag), or possibly even a giraffe! (Kochavei Yaakov)

According to Chazal, the tachash was a Kosher animal (possibly wild, possibly domesticated), which existed only temporarily (possibly miraculous), with a single horn in the front of its head (possibly two more small horns in the back) and, most importantly, an exquisite, naturally multi-coloured (possibly six-coloured) pelt. The tachash was a creature (Rashi tells us, based on Unkelos) who 'rejoices and takes pride in his many colours'.

These unique, dazzling rainbow pelts became the most encompassing and visible part of the Mishkon. Every visitor would be struck by their colours, draped over the Ohel Moed. What could this mean, and what can it teach us? The purpose of the Mishkan, explains the Rebbe, is that Hashem's Presence should permeate every facet of creation - 'v'shachanti b'socham'. The many colours of the Tachash skins hint at the incredible diversity and complexity that exists within creation.

They remind us that every single detail of life is directly connected to its source in the highest and most transcendent dimension of Hashem's light. When we live our lives with emunah and bitachon, and serve Hashem with simcha and mesirus nefesh, we channel and reveal that light, so that every facet of our lives is infused with Hashem's presence - v'shachanti b'socham - "I will dwell amongst them". This fulfills not only the purpose of the Mishkon, but also the purpose of the entire world.

One of the most important goals of a Chassidic education is to teach children how to 'rejoice and take pride' in their 'many colours'. Each child is unique, and every aspect of their day is cosmically significant. For a Chossid, this thought should not be overwhelming or, G-d forbid, a burden, but a source of joy and pride as we work to make this world into a 'mishkon' – a home for Hashem, and celebrate the greatest joy with Moshiach Now.

LEARNING INTERPERSONAL SKILLS

This week we started a class which will focus on the importance of interpersonal skills. We discussed how the Torah requires a person to refine himself progressively, and we brought sources from the Torah to emphasise the importance of interpersonal skills. Beyond the introduction, we embarked upon an investigation of the concept of empathy. We discussed why empathetic understanding is so critical (starting with what the Torah has to say), we looked into why it can nevertheless be challenging, and then we did a couple of exercises contrasting a more self centred perspective with one illuminated by empathy. In future weeks we will look at concepts such as relationship building, listening and framing, systematic decision-making and problem-solving, feedback and conflict management.
